Project Title: Online BA in Spanish
Sponsoring School and College: School of Language, Culture, and Society; College of Liberal Arts

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## Justification

We anticipate needing funds to develop and refresh all remaining courses that will be offered by Ecampus. Expenses as outlined above for the coordinator and advising positions are based on current salary.

In order to fully develop the film and literature courses, $\$ 4,500$ are required for the purchase of DVD classroom licenses and books. The DVD licenses will allow us to make the films available to our students as streaming media via Blackboard.

Additionally, the coordinator/advisor will require a laptop.

- The new online BA in Spanish will require a total of 28 new courses to be developed and made available online and 4 existing courses need to be refreshed (SPAN 211, 212, 213 and 317).
- SPAN 311, 312, 319 and 339 are part of the BA but have been created or refreshed recently and they don't need budget assigned at this time.
- SPAN 199 and 299 are not part of the BA but they will be needed as students with poor conversational skills will be advised to take them in order to progress into SPAN 311, 312 and 320 .
- The BA in Spanish consists in 12 mandatory upper-division credits and 33 upper division electives (see details below) covering various subjects such as language, literature, culture, linguistics and sociolinguistics to be approved by a major advisor.

## All prospective majors must consult with a program advisor at least once a year.

World, Language and Cultures majors must participate in an OUS, OSU-approved study abroad program, or in an approved internship experience in a Spanish speaking country or fulfill this requirement as determined by the director of the School of Language, Culture, and Society.

Students who do not find an OSU-approved program (this includes OUS and other programs run through IDEA and OUS) that fits their academic and/or geographical needs can petition to have a different program approved by a sub-committee of the Study Abroad Advisory Committee. The requirement for petitioning a program must include an academic and/or geographic reason why a student is choosing a program not on the list.

## Program Description

World Languages and Cultures, in cooperation with Ecampus, proposes this BA degree in Spanish, fully taught online, that will give nontraditional audiences the chance to graduate in a discipline on high demand. Spanish is a language with a strong and increasing presence in the United States and this degree will provide to our students the tools not only to be a proficient user but to understand and interact with the culture associated to the Spanish speaking world.

Spanish is spoken in more than 30 countries by 430 million speakers, but its relevance it is not limited to numbers of speakers and its spread around the globe. Spanish is profusely used in many fields such as business and economy, diplomacy, politics, medicine, research, culture, sports and many more. Focusing in the United States, Spanish is projected to remain the most commonly spoken non-English language in the country and the population of Spanish speakers is expected to continue growing during the upcoming years ${ }^{2}$. Therefore, having Spanish knowledge in a resume is a clear advantage nowadays.

Furthermore, the relevance of Spanish it is not limited to the population segment that aims at being more competitive in the job market. Understanding Spanish culture --and language-gives us a better chance of success when facing the social and economic challenges that are taking place in the United States. The state of Oregon itself is a clear example of these challenges. Taking all this into account and adding the stand for diversity taken by OSU in its Strategic Plan it makes sense and it is actually our responsibility to offer yet another option to get formal college education in Spanish. It is, in the end, a benefit to our whole community.

Finally, we honestly believe that the overall quality, the social justice component and the option for Spanish heritage students that characterizes SCLS and WLC programs give this BA in Spanish a solid base for success.
